

Attendance Updates

Thank you so much to our families for continuing to support your child's positive attendance. We continue to have supportive, positive conversations with families around attendance and the working together approach really does ensure that we are putting the children at the centre of attendance conversations.


I'd like to just emphasise a couple of points from the attendance policy.

*If your child is not at school and we haven't received a message, we will aim to make contact with you to find out the reason for absence before 9.45am. If we are unable to make contact and haven't had a reason for absence before 10.30am then we will begin to call other contacts we have for the child. On some occasions, we may undertake a home visit following the above actions in order to ensure the safeguarding of the child.

*If your child is unwell and not at school, then the office should be informed on any subsequent days of absence and not just the first day. This is to ensure we continue to record the child's absence using the correct attendance codes e.g. if the child has a sickness bug and is off for 48 hours then the office should be informed on both days. This doesn't need to be a phonecall, it can be an email or voice message.

Safeguarding

Please can we remind all families that we do not allow dogs on to any part of our school site. This includes dogs being carried. Please could we ask that you respect this policy and do not bring dogs on to the playground when collecting pupils. Thank you for your support with this.

Year 2 Cathedral trip

Year 2 had a fantastic trip to the Cathedral to support with their RE and Art learning. The children had a tour inside and outside of the Cathedral. They stopped to observe some of the impressive gothic architecture and even had a go at sketching some of the gargoyles. The children worked together to create their own version of the beautiful Dean's Eye stained glass window using collage materials. They also really enjoyed taking part in some activities in the Discovery Centre, including dressing up in robes and making their own Cathedral model. It sounds like you packed an awful lot into your day Year 2!

Curriculum and Learning




Year 6 Music


This term, Year 6 have been exploring the musical elements of pitch, texture and dynamics. They have listened to a composition by Felix Mendelssohn called 'Hebride's Overture' also known as Fingal's Cave and thought about how he tells a story with the orchestral instruments. The children have tried a variety of tuned and untuned percussion instruments as well as body percussion to create their own compositions which represent waves. This week, the children have been composing in groups to tell the journey of water. They are thinking carefully about the sounds that the instruments make and have been drawing graphic scores to represent the music. Lots of fun and plenty of noise in class!



British Values

In our assembly this week, Reception and KS1 looked at "The rule of law" as one of the British Values. We explored why rules are important and that they help to make sure we stay safe and that things are fair. We read a story called "But why can't I?" where the character George thinks rules are silly and doesn't want to follow them until he sees that things then start to go wrong! We also learnt about very important rules that people in Britain must follow and that these are called laws. We know that there are laws about how fast cars are allowed to drive, about not damaging property or hurting people. We discussed that the police are there to make sure laws are followed and to keep everyone safe. They are trusted adults!

<u>MHST</u>

St John's is now engaging and working with the Mental Health in Schools Team. This is an NHS service designed to help meet the mental health and emotional wellbeing needs of children in schools. They work collaboratively with school and other services where necessary to ensure these needs are being met for all children. School can make referrals to this team of qualified practitioners who will then assess whether they are able to provide or offer support to the child. If they are, then they may undertake a programme of support in school with the child. If they can't offer support for any reason, they can signpost school and

families to other services which may be able to help. We know that this will add a hugely valuable arm to our pastoral support at St John's. We cannot ask the MHST for support without parental consent and we won't discuss any children without obtaining this first.

Message for the Year 6s—SATs

Next week is an important week for our Year 6 pupils as they complete their SATs. I know that Mr Dunn, Mrs Ballard and the whole of the Year 6 team couldn't be prouder of the children's hard work, self-discipline and positivity over the last few weeks when revising for these tests. The children are well prepared and I have every confidence that they will do their very best which is all we ask of them. We know they are important and the children value their importance which is why they have prepared so well for them, however, I'd also like to point out that SATs do not measure how kind or thoughtful you are. They do not measure how artistic and creative you may be and they do not measure everything that

makes you special and unique. My message to the Y6s is this: do your best, put into practice everything you have been taught and think carefully about the questions. However, also remember that your talents and successes reach far beyond the score you get from these tests and we know what amazing young people you are. Good luck Year 6—we are all with you!
